W. Erwin Diewert is a Professor in the Department of Economics at the University of British Columbia. He has been a member of the Department since 1970. He has a B.A. degree and an M.A. in mathematics from the University of British Columbia and a Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley. Diewert's four main areas of research are: flexible functional forms, duality theory, applied economics and index number theory. He has played an active role in shaping modern official economic statistics in Canada and internationally. He has been Chairman since 1984 of the Statistics Canada External Advisory Committee on Prices. He is also a Member of the Statistics Canada Services Advisory Committee, a Member of the Statistics Canada Advisory Group on Science and Technology, and a past member of the National Statistics Council. He was the only Canadian and indeed the only non-U.S. member on the U.S. Schultze commission, and is one of the contributors to the widely cited report of that commission (At What Price? Conceptualizing and Measuring Cost of Living and Price Indexes, C.L. Schultze and C. Mackie (eds.), Washington, DC: National Academy Press, 2002). He played an important role in the Canberra Group set up by the United Nations to provide input to the 2008 revision of the international guidelines for the System of National Accounts. He authored numerous chapters for the 2004 Consumer and Producer Price Index Manuals and the 2008 Export and Import Price Index Manual sponsored by a consortium of six international organizations (the United Nations, the International Monetary Fund, Eurostat, the International Labour Organization, the OECD and the World Bank). He has been a long standing member and is a former chair of the Technical Advisory Group for the International Comparison Program of the World Bank. His contributions in other areas as well to the economics profession are reflected in the fact that he is a long standing Research Associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, a Fellow of the Econometric Society, a Fellow of the World Academy of Productivity Science, and a Distinguished Fellow of the American Economic Association. In recent years he has won many prestigious awards including, the Canada Council for the Arts-Killiam Prize 2003, Canadian Economic Association Doug Purvis Memorial Prize 2005, and recipient of the 2005 Julius Shiskin Memorial Award for Economic Statistics. He is also the principal author and co-editor with Alice Nakamura of the book, Essays in Index Number Theory. He is currently editing (with B.M. Balk, D. Fixler, K.J. Fox and A.O. Nakamura) an 8 volume series titled *Price and Productivity Measurement*, three volumes of which are already published with publication of the rest expected later this year and in early 2012. Finally, he has published 98 journal articles and 122 book chapters.
