8. TEACHING

(a) *Areas of special interest and accomplishments*

Throughout my teaching, I strive to introduce students to scholarly research in the discipline, engaging with it from a variety of perspectives and connecting the ideas learnt in class to real world applications. In my Principles of Economics course this takes the form of group presentations and debate of published research summaries. In my Economic History courses I use creative writing assignments and knowledge translation video projects. Students thus learn how to apply and project frontier research beyond the confines of a university course. I have also led two small research and discussion seminars (ECON 492 – taught on overload both times), co-designing them with groups of interested students. On the graduate supervision front, I have supplemented the naturally low numbers of graduate students that choose to pursue economic history as a specialization by attracting and advising post-doctoral fellows and visiting doctoral students.

9. **SCHOLARLY AND PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES**(a) *Areas of special interest and accomplishments*

My research explores the nature of state institutions and markets in early modern Europe. My ongoing project on the Spanish Inquisition highlights the long-term effects of religious persecution carried out by state actors. My work on sovereign debt shows how defaults could function as insurance devices, shielding both monarchs and bankers from the worst effects of large, unanticipated adverse situations. Earlier work focused on the nature of the urban economy in early modern Toledo; the structure of the Spanish nobility and its impact on local economies; the role that apparently inefficient institutions can play when legal systems are too rigid to adapt to a changing economic environment; and the interaction between resource windfalls and institutions. All my research is grounded in meticulous archival work, and relies critically on insights that can only be gained through the detailed study of primary sources.
